

#### LOOKING BACKWARD AND AHEAD

(Excerpt from "Mr. Glover's Groton")

A review of the past seventy-five years indicates that in many ways Groton has changed drastically. Agriculture has all but disappeared: there are only two sawmills operating and lumbering is no longer a major industry: the granite sheds and the small industries have closed: the railroad and busses, which once linked the town with the outside world, have faded from memory. Perhaps the single change which has touched the greatest number of people has been the transfer of responsibility for running the schools from the town to the union school district, unless it be the modern snowplows with their salting devices which keep the town roads open year round. Yes, in many ways Groton has changed drastically!

Neverthe less, in many ways Groton is the same today as it was at the turn of the century. A traveler who rode through the little village in 1900 and returned three-quarters of a century later might well be surprised at the few changes he would perceive. True, most of the roads are paved now, there are a few bright gas pumps, more modern signs, and here and there a new building, such as the modern firehouse, but our friend probably would not miss those buildings which burned over the last seventy-five years. Groton's early American and colonial architecture is still intact.

The same two churches still serve their respective memberships which have not varied greatly over the years. Most of the older families have remained in Groton, some of their children have

left home hoping to find better opportunity elsewhere, but there have been no drastic surges or declines in the population.

Perhaps the most significant change has been the gradual influx of newcomers who, contrary to Vermont tradition, have been accepted by the townspeople as these strangers offered to take part in the life of the communi-Bringing new ideas, fresh viewpoints, and useful skills, these men and women have helped enrich the town. Assuming roles in the town government and the churches, on the school board, and in various organizations as well as in the business community, they are becoming a part of Groton's heritage as they bring new enthusiasm for today and hope for tomorrow.

Groton is a fortunate melding of the old and the new, the family with roots going back many generations, and the outsider who is made to feel welcome. It is indeed unique.

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The Groton Historical Society announces that The Historical House will be open for visitors each Sunday during the months of July and August, from 2:00 to 5:00 PM.

You are all invited to drop in and look around this beautifully furnished old house. Even if you have been in to see it before, come again. Additional pieces are being added all the time, and it is well worth visiting again.
